ARTISTIC DIRECTORS' NOTES

WHY THE DANCE OF DA VINCI?

Renaissance humanism is relevant now more than ever - that we cannot continue to separate science from math from art from dance from humanity in our schooling and in our lives. The Renaissance, especially under Da Vinci's watch spurred an incredible amount of inquiry, invention, thought and art in many forms. We need that inquiry and forward thinking again to allow humanity to flourish and to survive

WHAT INSPIRED THIS FOCUS ON DAVINCI?

I would say that it is one of those dances that found me. A few years ago I took my first trip to Italy. Fell in love with the country, the art, the culture, as I suspected I would. We spent only a day in Florence where I began only to touch the surface of the Florentine history. On a subsequent trip to France I remember seeing the Mona Lisa in an incredibly over crowded Louvre. Suffocating really. Everyone there was trying to take selfies with the Mona Lisa. Turned me off. A couple of years later I was mulling about what my next big project would be and The Dance of da Vinci popped into my head. I said to myself, "Well that is interesting, I know almost nothing about him." Then things began to snowball. I met a new friend who introduced me to Jean Paul Richter's "Notebooks." On one side Leonardo's writings are in written in Italian and the other the English translation. They are filled with sketches, musings, maxims and "how-tos." Once I dove in, I discovered the human he was: an artist, a mathematician, philosopher, scientist, architect. I felt a kinship as I, too, have always felt myself more than just a dancer.

HOW IS DA VINCI USED TO SHAPE THE CHOREOGRAPHY?

The primary reason Leonard da Vinci works as an inspiration is because he himself was a humanist polymath. He studied everything and limited himself to nothing. He felt, he loved, he had his "demons," he had his "passions." He embraced life and nature, science and art. Our present world is filled with Leonardo's work as an artist and a scientist. Our present world of flight is because he dared to dream about flying. He observed the birds. He felt we could go there. The question now is: Where can we go? Where do we as humans need to go and how do we get there?

HOW HAS THE PIECE BEEN CRAFTED TO ALLOW THE AUDIENCE TO AKNOWI FDGF DA VINCI'S WORK?

The dance is broken into four sections that correspond to Leonardo's work. Section 1 focuses on his work as a sculptor, painter and observer of human movement. Section 2 is inspired by his observations of animals, not only for drawing purposes but also how they equate to human behavior and vice versa. Section 3 draws from his work as an architect, machine builder, and inventor. Section 4 brings it all together. His work was forward thinking. We, as humans, can continue to be forward thinking, must be forward thinking to survive, create and thrive

The dance is supported with original music, Italian renaissance madrigals, live vocals from 26 voices, projections, light and of course the dancers. Marrying the elements as da Vinci would appreciate.

WHAT STYLES OF DANCE ARE INCORPORATED?

While the main "technique" is modern, I pull from all I and my dancers have absorbed through study and practice Ballet, hip-hop, acrobatics, Renaissance dance, Cross-Fit, contemporary. Dance is movement refined. Humans move.

ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Sonia Plumb attributes her artistic style to a morphing of ideas with dance, constantly seeking to observe, learn, question, and collaborate. Her choreographic studies led her to multiple intensives with Mark Morris, Pilobolus and Susan Marshall. Early on her work was presented in dance festivals such as New Dance/New Haven, A New Generation of Dance/SUNY Purchase, New Haven International Festival of Arts and Ideas, and Hartford's Dance Services Network.

In addition to her role with the Company, Sonia has served as the first Artist-in-Residence at the University of St. Joseph and teaches at the award-winning magnet school, the CREC Greater Hartford Academy of the Arts High School.

Sonia is a two-time recipient of the Connecticut Commission on the Arts Fellowship for Artistic Excellence, and the Hartford Business Journal's list of 40 under 40 for distinguished achievement. She received a National Teaching Fellowship (2013), and was one of only nine artists nationwide to receive the Community Legacy Project award for her Arts Integration programs (2015). Born and raised in Vermont, she migrated to Hartford to attend Trinity College in Hartford, Connecticut where she received a B.A. in Theater and Dance

DESIGN TEAM

Suzanne Gates has been Artistic Director of CitySingers of Hartford since 1985 when she established it as a professionally performing chamber choir of approximately twenty-five singers who perform music of a variety of styles and periods, both a cappella and accompanied, including works with instrumental ensembles. Other projects include conducting the treble choir for a production of Benjamin Britten's WAR REQUIEM, a MESSIAH sing-in, guest conducting for the American Choral Directors Association SUMMER SING-INS, preparing the chorus for a performance of Samuel Barber's PRAYERS OF KIERKEGAARD and conducting Bach's CANTATA 182 for choir, soloists and chamber orchestra for the American Guild of Organists. Ms. Gates graduated with a BA degree in music from Trinity College in Hartford, CT. She has a Masters of Music degree from Westminster Choir College of Rider University in Princeton, NJ where she studied conducting with Joseph Flummerfelt, Allen Crowell and Dennis Schrock. She has also studied orchestral conducting at Hartt School of Music in Hartford and done workshop study with Robert Shaw, Robert Page, Dennis Keene and Charles Bruffy.

Sabrina Notarfrancisco (Costumes) is an Associate Professor of Theater at Connecticut College and has designed costumes for over 70 academic and professional productions. She is an active member of OISTAT (The International Organization of Scenographers and Theater Architects) and serves as the international costume delegate for USITT (United States Institute of Theater Technology). In addition to designing and teaching, Sabrina has presented her designs at numerous conferences around the world, exhibited her work in the Costume at THE TURN OF THE CENTURY exhibit at the Bakhrushin State Central Theatre Museum in Moscow, and was recently appointed the associate international editor for the Theater Design & Technology journal. Sabrina is thrilled to join the Sonia Plumb Dance Company and looks forward to collaborating on costumes for future productions.

Michael Wall (Composer) is an internationally recognized composer, performer and educator who collaborates with dancers, choreographers and filmmakers around the world. He composes original music, accompanies dance classes, and teaches sound design for dance and performance with Ableton Live. Michael has worked at Rutgers University, Princeton University, NYU, The Ohio State University, The Bates Dance Festival, The American Dance Festival and is currently on faculty at The University of Utah, School of Dance. He has supported independent artists in digital music distribution for the last ten years and offers a comprehensive online library of music for dance students, teachers and choreographers. Bryan Swormstedt (Projections) is a local filmmaker who graduated from the University of Connecticut with a BFA in Theater. After moving to New York City and appearing in a few stage productions he decided to pursue further education and received his Masters in Film and Television from Savannah College of Art and Design. He is currently an Artist Instructor at the Greater Hartford Academy of the Arts and is also filming a documentary and scripting two dramatic web-series.

Michael Chybowski (Lighting Designer) is an internationally known lighting designer having worked in opera, dance and theater. His credits include designs for Mark Morris, Mark Morris Dance Group, Laurie Anderson, The Public Theater, Seattle Opera, Chicago Opera, American Repertory Theater and internationally with Theatre de Carouge, Geneva, L Train to El Dorado Squat Theatre (Vienna, Holland, Zurich, Hamburg) and Dreamland Burns Squat Theatre (Milan, Sardinia), as well as appearances at the Edinburgh, Hong Kong, Adelaide, and New Zealand Arts Festivals with the Mark Morris Dance Group.

Sarah Barney (Apprentice Level 1) loves to dance and circus. She has trained in jazz, acrobatics, tap, and contemporary dance. She has received technical awards for her advanced acrobatic ability. Sarah recently graduated from CREC's Greater Hartford Academy of the Arts dance department. She also trains in aerial silks and slings, and the flying trapeze.

Corrine Bates is a dancer, teacher and choreographer based in the Hartford area. She grew up in Middletown, CT and attended the Greater Hartford Academy of the Arts as a dance major. Corrine received her BFA in Dance and Choreography from Virginia Commonwealth University where she worked with such choreographers as Monica Bill Barnes, Daniel Gwirtzman, Heidi Weiss, Gerri Houlihan, and faculty member Christian Von Howard. While attending VCU her work was presented at the American College Dance Association and she was invited to perform at the National Festival at the Kennedy Center, under the instruction of Christian Von Howard. Corrine has performed and presented her own work at the Ailey Studios in New York, and in 2011 was again invited to perform at the Ailey Studios, dancing with the Von Howard Project. In 2014 she spent the year dancing with dancEnlight, led by Lorelei Chang. Corrine is currently a Core Dance Faculty member at the Greater Hartford Academy of the Arts high school.

Joseph Beltre (Apprentice Level 2) was born and raised in Brooklyn, NY. Joseph attended Fiorello H. LaGuardia High School of Music, Art and Performing Arts. He graduated in 2015 and began his studies as a performance emphasis major at The University of Hartford The Hartt School. He studied there for two years before branching out into the professional world of dance. Joseph has worked with choreographers such as Adam Barruch, Damani Pompey, Yesid Lopez, Lucy Bowen McCauley and Stephen Pier. Joseph participated as an apprentice with DeMa dance company in New York. Professional performance venues include, Be A Light For Peace- Shinnyo Lantern Floating Ceremony, ACDA New England Regional Dance Conference, In Remembrance - Dancing for Orlando at City Center Dance Studios, Mandela The Premier, The East Harlem Repertory Theatre, Festival of Schools at the Alvin Ailey Theatre and Jacob's Pillow.

Meagan McGrail (Apprentice Level 2) is from Goffstown, NH where she attended New England School of Dance and studied numerous styles of dance since the age of three. She trained in Jazz, Tap, Modern, Improvisation, Contemporary, Musical Theater, Pointe, and Ballet, completing all levels of the Royal Academy of Dance (RAD) syllabus. She is currently a junior at the University of Hartford with an anticipated graduation date of May 2019 with a BSBA in Marketing and a Minor in Dance and Project Management. While studying at the University of Hartford Meagan performed at ACDA New England Regional Dance Conference. She recently studied at San Francisco Conservatory where she performed dances under the direction of Courtney Mazeika, Alex Ketley, and Christian Burns.

Jasmine McPherson (Apprentice Level 1) is a passionate dancer who enjoys all forms of movement and has both danced and performed since she was five years old. She is trained in Jazz, Modern, Ballet, Contemporary, Hip-Hop, Popping, House, and Waacking. She competes in world-wide and local competitions such as Hip Hop International, Prelude's New York and Boston, and World of Dance. Aside from the Sonia Plumb Dance Company, she dances at Studio-8-Sixty in Hartford where she teaches and is also captain for the senior dance team (Team 860) and the junior team dance team (Elite 860).

Richard Pye was born in North Norfolk, England and trained in a variety of dance styles from a young age. After graduating from the Centre for Advanced Training scheme, he attended Purchase Conservatory of Dance New York and London Contemporary Dance School graduating with First Class Honours. During his studies, Richard performed with Lea Anderson on HAND IN GLOVE at The Victoria and Albert Museum, a new work, SHE PAINTED FLOWERS by James Cousins and Jose Limon's A CHORE-OGRAPHIC OFFERING at the Joyce Theatre Limon Festival. After graduating he performed The SNOW QUEEN with The London Ballet Company on their UK tour. Richard has also worked with choreographer Adrian Look on his new creation FATHERS AND SONS and with Choreographer James Cousins on his work ROSALIND, performed at The Edinburgh Festival. Most recently just finished an Italian Tour with Artistic Director Stephano Poda.

Alanna Sade-Milberg is from Buffalo, NY where she trained in the Balanchine style of ballet for 13 years at the American Academy of Ballet. In 2012, Alanna began attending the University of Massachusetts Amherst as a Dance major with a concentration in Pre-Medical Studies. At UMass Amherst, she began exploring other types of dance such as Modern, Jazz, and Contemporary. She had the opportunity to perform works by Sidra Bell, Jennifer Hart, Thomas Vacanti as well as other choreographers. In 2014, Alanna attended the American College Dance Association National Festival where she performed in the Gala performance at the Kennedy Center. In 2016, Alanna graduated with a B.A. in dance and has recently been accepted into the Yale School of Nursing.

Lamaree Wilson (Apprentice Level 1) is trained in popping, jazz, contemporary, street jazz, ballet, and Hip-Hop dance. He competes in world wide Hip-Hop competitions such as World of Dance, Prelude Hip-Hop dance competition, and HHI(Hip-Hop International). He's also captain of two Hip-Hop competing teams called 860 Elite and Team 860 at Studio-8-Sixty in Hartford and does performances locally and out of state.
